August is upon us - a harvest month which brings the bounty of the season. August was named after a major figure of the ancient Roman World, Augustus Caesar (63 B.C.–A.D. 14). He was the first Roman emperor (though he never claimed the title) and the great nephew of the previous ruler Julius Caesar (who named July after himself).

It starts with an old harvest holiday, Lammas Day. This observance, traditionally observed on August 1, marked the beginning of the harvest, and especially celebrated the first wheat crop, or that of corn. On Lammas Day, loaves of bread were baked from the first-ripened grain and brought to the churches to be consecrated. Much folklore is associated with this day, including this proverb: "After Lammas Day, corn ripens as much by night as by day."

An upcoming event for your diary, organised by St Mary's Church Woodnesborough, is the Sixties Night on **Saturday 7**th **October**. Please see the poster on the back cover - phone or text to book your tickets. It's sure to be popular! 



Eco Church

After a concerted effort among the congregation and PCC, Woodnesborough Church achieved a **Bronze Eco Church** award earlier this year. The overall aim of the Eco Church award scheme is to celebrate the ways that church communities have been engaging with caring for the earth as a key part of our Christian faith.

Some of the things we are doing to encourage bees and pollinators include:

- Planting of plants that attract insects such as lavender and other herbs, sowing of wildflowers seeds and sunflower seeds as well as planting of blossom bearing trees including fruit bearing trees.
- Allowing the natural propagation of plants including nettles.
- The use of ceramic plant pots to try and encourage solitary bees to form nests inside.

We aim to promote as much biodiversity as possible. If you are passing, please feel free to wander around the grounds to enjoy the calming atmosphere.



Woodnesborough Parish Council

The Parish Council met on 16th May and 27th June, the earlier date due to the fact that we had to hold our Annual Meeting within 14 days of the election. The Annual meeting was one at

which we appointed our Officers and I would like to thank the members of the council for voting me to the position of Chair again and also for voting Cllr Alastair Boniface as my Vice Chair. We discussed the fact that as both Cllrs Doug Smith and Alison Hilton were not standing this year we have two vacancies to which can co-opt two people. One person had expressed an interest and they were advised to contact the Clerk.

At the meeting in May we nominated members for our committees and appointments were made to various roles. After the minutes had been read and signed and any actions dealt with at each meeting, we discussed the planning applications on the agenda and we noted any planning decisions. Planning correspondence and other correspondence was noted by the council. The consultation documents were noted by the Council and we had reports from our County Cllr prior to the meetings.

Correspondence was discussed including the continued breach of planning at land south of Summerfield and at Hollyoak. We also were aware of anti-social behaviour at the Hall as well as continued dog fouling where owners fail to pick up their waste. We had also received an email from a member of the public with several issues highlighted but this was received too late for the May meeting and so was discussed at the June meeting. The Clerk has written to the parishioner in response.

At our meeting in June we learned that 4 parishioners had expressed an interest in being co-opted to the Council and so Jo our Clerk will arrange for interviews to be held and will contact them with dates and times.

We were also advised at the June meeting that a new flagpole has been delivered and installed near the village green. A big thank you to Cllr Anthony Hilton for doing so much work to get it there and for flying the flag earlier this month.

On a wider note the Council continues to work with our District and County Councillors to try to make sure that the Richborough refuse and recycling centre remains open and that KCC do not act arbitrarily to close it.

Thank you to all of you who come to our meetings and for taking an interest in your council. Don't forget that you can come along to any of our meetings as we are here to ensure our parishioners are our priority and it's always good to have members of the public at our meetings. Letting your heir down?

In recent years, property inflation and rising asset values have combined to push more estates over the nil-rate band for Inheritance Tax (IHT). The residence nil-rate band helps to a degree, but with the IHT threshold frozen at £325,000 per individual, IHT is no longer a tax just for the rich – or even moderately wealthy. More estates are paying IHT sometimes unnecessarily when there are preventative ways of overpaying. For example, those with sufficient assets to trigger an IHT liability on death, could use the exemption which allows anyone to give away up to £3,000 worth of gifts each tax year, which would not be included in the value of their estate. However, not knowing what does or does not form part of an estate could result in their families paying more IHT than they need to.

Another way to reduce the impact of IHT is to take out a 'whole of life' insurance policy. This pays a lump sum on death, and when the policy is written in trust, the pay-out can help offset or eliminate an IHT bill. Whilst inertia and ignorance of estate planning is good news for the Treasury, the widespread lack of knowledge will worry many potential heirs. But taking appropriate advice can go a long way to alleviating those concerns. A financial adviser can assist with the transfer of wealth in a tax-efficient manner, establishing trusts, life insurance and so on, whilst also ensuring that the person arranging their estate has enough income to maintain their normal standard of living. Kent Fostering and Supported Homes



Kent County Council's (KCC) Fostering Service, Kent Fostering, is urgently calling for residents to consider fostering in the midst of a national foster carer recruitment and retention "state of emergency".

Nationally, 63,000 new foster families need to be recruited over the next five years to replace those leaving the system, however based on the current trend fewer than 40,000 are expected to join the fostering community.

Many vulnerable children and young people in Kent urgently need safe and loving homes in their local communities so that they can stay near their schools and friendship groups and not miss out on the vital care and support they need.

Matching the growing number of children in the council's care with the right foster family is becoming more difficult as numbers increase alongside a rapid decline in the number of residents becoming foster carers.

This could mean that there will not be enough suitable homes in the very near future and Kent's vulnerable children and young people could miss out on the support they need to give them the best opportunities and outcomes in life.

Birding With Big Nick



On a recent visit to Sandwich Bay, I photographed a gull which looked a bit unusual. My first impression was of a Mediterranean Gull (not that uncommon in the south east now, despite its name!) However the shape of the bill and colour of legs and bill - a darkish maroon colour - was much more in keeping with a Black-headed Gull than the scarlet legs and bill of the Mediterranean Gull. Fortunately for me it had a coloured leg ring with lettering which I was able to read.

I sent off the record and had an email back confirming that it was indeed a hybrid between the 2 species mentioned. Even more interesting was that it had actually only recently been ringed just 32 days earlier near Lodz in POLAND, some 1193Km away!



This gave me the inspiration for my column. This was not the first time I have photographed and reported birds with coloured leg rings or even the detailed small metal leg band which are more widely used in ringing; but these are much harder to read 'in the field' and you need to be very close to photograph them!

Nearly one million birds were ringed in 2021 in the UK but recovery rates are low, usually – in the past at least, - when the bird was found dead or injured. However the increase in bird photographers has probably helped with reporting numbers in recent years. If you ever find a ringed bird you can report your sighting via the Euring website https://euring.org/ and hopefully you will receive information about the bird.

Without this ringing data we would have little idea of where birds came from or how far they travelled, or how long they live, so it provides some very valuable data. In recent years a more sophisticated system has been used, that of attaching a tiny radio transmitter to the bird and then using a series of aerials to detect them as they move about. It was this system that recorded the movement of a Common Whitethroat first picked up by a mast in Germany and tracked across Europe to Sandwich Bay, covering over 600 Km in just under four days!

There are three other birds - pictured on the next page - I have photographed that have rings. The Herring Gull was ringed by the North Thames Gull Group at Pitsea landfill site in Essex in March 2016 and there have been several sightings since then all around Sandwich Bay. The Ringed Plover,

photographed at Reculver, was coincidentally another Polish bird ringed at the mouth of the river Vistula on the Baltic coast. The last bird, the Shag, was ringed on the Isle of May, Fife, in June 2019, photographed at Ramsgate Harbour in Feb 2020; it was the first sighting since it had been ringed.







Every reported sighting adds a little more information about the amazing behaviour of different bird species, so keep your eyes peeled.



Preston walk - 2.7 miles - (1 hour)



From the pub turn left onto Grove Road, then take FP on left. Go through gate, then go right, continuing in same direction. Turn right on road. Turn left past yew trees onto Park Lane next to Forstal House. At road junction turn right onto road the Preston Court. Take FP through churchyard. Retrace steps but take FP on right near gate to the green, bus shelter and Village Store on main road. Cross road and go down Mill Lane passing school on right. Take FP next to school playground passing school and playing field on right. Continue on FP along field edge. At orchard look for FP line diagonally to left winding through apple trees. Emerge onto Mill Lane by the Bakery and a white house. Turn left on road and go straight ahead, passing Preston Mill on right and straight on past junction with another road on right. Where road bends left, take FP straight on to left of gate to return to main road by the butchers. Turn right to garden centre and the pub.

FP = Footpath
