



All our helpers are DBS checked and have Safeguarding training to level 2. I have safeguarding to level 3.



My thanks go to Alastair who stood in for me. The meeting was attended by seven members of the public who wished to comment on two issues that had come before the council for discussion.

After the minutes had been read and signed and any actions dealt with, the council discussed and they noted 5 planning decisions. Planning correspondence was noted and the council were pleased to note that the two houses due to be built between 15 and 17 Foxborough Close are going ahead at last. Other correspondence was noted by the council, including various issues with Highways complaints and also that someone continues to place their household rubbish in the bin by the church and bus shelter. These have all been reported to the appropriate authority.

The Village Hall car park has been relined and members were pleased with the work carried out, various other matters regarding the hall were discussed and after finance had been agreed, the meeting closed at 9.55pm.

The next meeting of the council took place on 25<sup>th</sup> October with 1 member of the public present. After the minutes were read and signed, actions from the last meeting were noted, we discussed 3 planning applications and noted 2 decisions, we noted planning correspondence and also reports from our County and District Councillors. Various items relating to the Village Hall were discussed and finance agreed. The meeting closed at 9pm.

The council does not meet in November so the next meeting will be 6<sup>th</sup> December.




















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# Poem of the Month

# **Birding With Big Nick**



Back in the early 1980s I went to Stodmarsh with some friends to see a bird which was rare in the UK at the time, it, or rather they, were Glossy Ibis. Three birds would fly into the reed beds most evenings to roost. At the time it was quite a coup to see one in the UK. Glossy Ibis are quite big, heron-like birds with a large curved bill and when the light is right, they have richly coloured feathers of greens, purples and bronze. In Europe, they usually live in the Mediterranean region but have a large global distribution.

At that time it was thought that they might be the next species to colonise the UK from southern Europe, as it turned out, they weren't; several other species, notably the Little Egret and even Great White Egret have done that. However, sightings have increased over the intervening years to the point that they are now seen every year in numerous locations around the country, and more to the point, in Kent.

This year alone, 11 birds were seen flying over Sandwich Bay in January; several appeared at Dungeness in the summer, two of which remained for several weeks. They have also been seen at Stodmarsh, Worth Marshes, Oare and Elmley. It's not possible to say whether these sightings are of the same birds but it is quite likely, but it does show that they are being seen much more frequently.





In August I went to Dungeness to see the two remaining Glossy Ibis, one of which was feeding very close to the hide giving great views.

However my best photos came from an unexpected location. I heard that one had been seen in a small pond near some of the new housing on the edge of Sholden. I used Google satellite images to locate the pond and went there with little expectation of success, but I was soon proved wrong. Feeding happily on water snails and any other aquatic life it could find was a splendid Glossy Ibis. It was incredibly confiding and barely took any notice of people passing by – or even my wife and I sitting on the bank of the pond photographing it.

So maybe the predictions of it colonising the UK may soon be fulfilled, watch this space!



# The Summerfield Dornier – a story of reconciliation.



Dennis was only a boy, young and energetic, at the start of World War 2. He and other children would run about the fields around his parents' farm waving to the planes as they soared in the skies overhead. One day, the 16<sup>th</sup> Aug 1940 in the late afternoon, he was with his brother outside when they saw a huge plane getting lower and lower heading for their house. His mother grabbed him, they laid down, thinking it was going to hit their house, but it didn't, nor did it hit the house next door, it suddenly swerved and crash landed in the field opposite.

They saw two parachutes coming down, one landed in the chicken run of a house nearby, where the family there went and looked after him. The second one was the pilot Heinz Mollenbroek, whose parachute had landed in a plum tree by Summerfield Farm.

Ron and Curly, two farm workers went down with a shot gun and managed to get him down off the tree. They took him to the farmhouse where Dennis' step-grandmother, who had been a nurse in the First World War, tended to him. One of his arms was hanging very loose and he had a very serious chest injury, his step-grandmother stemmed the bleeding and made the pilot as comfortable as she could. She gave him a glass of his grandfather's whisky, (which his grandfather might not have been pleased about!)

The army took him away, and Dennis' family didn't hear any more about where he had been taken. That was the last they heard of him, until the summer of 1990 when the vicar of Woodnesborough received a letter from the BBC saying they wanted to make a film about a German plane that had gone down over Woodnesborough, and it was about the Summerfield plane.

The BBC contacted Dennis via the vicar and said they wanted to make a film called *the Blitz*. The came to look around and later brought a cherry picker, lots of cameras and equipment that they stored in the barn overnight.

Dennis agreed to meet Heinz at Dover when he came over on the boat train to Dover Harbour station. The BBC filmed the next day, Dennis's wife and daughter-in-law provided refreshments for everyone. They were taken to lunch at the Black Pig pub and the camera crew filmed interviews with Ron and Curly and with Heinz, which took all day. When they spoke to Heinz everyone found out a lot more about what had happened that day.

Heinz had been flying a Dornier and at that time most of the targets were airfields, as they were trying to wipe out the Spitfires and Hurricanes. Heinz was heading towards London, probably towards Hornchurch airfield, but it was very foggy, so he decided to return with his bombs as he couldn't drop them, but he was intercepted at Whitstable by a Hurricane and the plane was damaged, so he shed his cargo of two bombs - but he never made it back. The two other members of the crew were not so lucky - their parachutes didn't open and they were buried in Ash churchyard.


After he left, Heinz had been taken to a hospital in Chartham for ten days, then to the Herbert Hospital in Woolwich, where he was treated for his wounds and stayed several weeks. He was interned in several camps over the next few years in England. He was a very good artist and drew several pictures in pen and ink of the camps he was put in, which Dennis has copies of.

The Swedish were neutral during the war and were working on taking badly injured German prisoners to be exchanged for badly injured British prisoners. In 1943 Heinz was taken to Glasgow then to Sweden where he was exchanged.

After he had been on his first visit back to Staple, Heinz returned three times. He was in agriculture in Germany and he had a small farm, so he and Dennis had something in common.

The Germans buried at Ash were later taken to Cannock Chase where there is a huge German cemetery. Heinz went there to pay his respects on one of his visits.

One sad thing for Dennis was that his step-grandmother, who was 97, only died a few weeks before the programme was made, so she never knew what happened. Heinz was very sad not to meet her to thank her for her kindness. Everyone got ready to watch the programme when it was due to be broadcast, but it never happened, as something that was probably more important was shown in its place! The other odd thing was that the film was called *the Blitz*, but the Blitz only started on 7th Sept 1940, three weeks after the Dornier came down, and took place mainly in 1941.



The Dornier plane had been taken away by the RAF and it was not that badly damaged, but bits and pieces were lying strewn about everywhere. Dennis' father, who had been a special constable during the war, kept a piece of the plane and had it put on a plaque. Dennis presented it to Heinz when he visited. The families of Dennis and Heinz stayed in touch for a long time. Some of Heinz's family came back

several times, in fact, only a week ago, Heinz's two daughters came to stay on the farm. A real story of reconciliation and friendship.


