Notes from St Mary's

It does not need me to say that the coronavirus has dominated everything in recent weeks, and every news report, every article, every letter, every sermon, has some aspect or angle of COVID-19 as its subject. So I suspect you would very much like me to talk about something different in this magazine article, which might enable us to take our minds off this pandemic and focus perhaps on more uplifting and more spiritual matters.

Well, I am sorry to disappoint, because there are two interesting, maybe unexpected, phenomena which we have witnessed during the coronavirus outbreak, and which I think are worth our further reflection.

The first thing which is noteworthy has been the capacity, and indeed willingness, of the British people, to accept and indeed embrace unprecedented restrictions to their daily lives. Yes, there have been some notable exceptions such as people forming a human caterpillar to climb up Snowdon or flocking to the local park or beach, but these have been newsworthy because they have been the exception rather than the rule. By and large, the roads have little traffic, town and city centres are empty and folk are isolating at home.

However, this broad consensus and cooperation was not by any means being taken for granted in advance by the authorities. There was genuine concern that a significant proportion of the population would ignore the restrictions altogether, and that was one reason why a fuller lockdown was not imposed earlier. But cooperate people have, willingly accepting the inconveniences and quickly adapting to very different lifestyles.

Now this is actually very encouraging, because it does show that when the chips are down, people are willing to accept significant change, and change which might have far reaching implications.

This new strain of coronavirus has had an immediate impact demanding urgent action; but it is not the only major challenge facing humanity. What it has demonstrated is that when the need is there, and when a good case can be made, then people together are willing to make personal sacrifices for the common good – and that can only be very encouraging.

The second interesting aspect of this, is that the well-being of people has been put very firmly before economic interest. How often have we been told in the past that there is no funding available to help people in need – even when the long-term economic impact of doing nothing may be yet more serious.

Again, the strategy adopted was not a foregone conclusion and it could well have been argued (as Donald Trump, and to a lesser extent, our own

Government, considered) that the economic impact of a lockdown was just too high. The argument could easily have been put that, yes, people will catch the virus, many will be very ill and some will die; but the wheels of industry will continue to turn, immunity will be established in the population and life will return to normality.

We are yet to see what the economic impact will be, and it will be immense, but... people's health and well-being, and the ability of the NHS to cope has taken a higher priority. This has clearly been made easier given that just about every country has taken the same route – and it really demonstrates the strength which international cooperation potentially offers. I suppose the major challenge will be to see how well the rich nations can support the poorest countries when COVID-19 really begins to bite there.

So as we continue on this journey, uncertain as the weeks and months ahead may be, we shall have to turn our attention again to the major issues of our time, such as loss of biodiversity and climate change. Maybe, just maybe, our tussle with this coronavirus will offer us invaluable lessons and insights. In the meantime, we are reminded that we are a part of one community under God, and every member of that community is worthy of our love and concern.

Woodnesborough Parish Council

The Parish Council met, via Zoom, on Tuesday 8th December and we received apologies from Cllr Vine and District Cllr Holloway.

As no members of the public had asked to be present at the meeting we proceeded with business. Declarations of interest were made and the minutes from the last meeting were read and information about the actions from that meeting was received. As a council we receive regular Coronavirus updates during the month and these were confirmed.

We received 5 planning applications and objected to 2, agreed with 2 and had no comment to make on the last one. We also received 5 planning decisions, though only 4 affected our council directly, one we had commented on as it was for a neighbouring parish but directly affected an application within the parish. We had had several items of correspondence, mostly consultation documents and we noted these.

Reports were provided before the meeting by County Cllr Sue Chandler, District Cllr M J Holloway. There were no reports from Parish Councillors.

After discussing matters regarding the Village Hall and agreeing payments, the meeting closed. Our next meeting is on 26th January and I will report on that in the next magazine. Should you wish to raise any issues related to the village or our environment please contact us. You can apply to join the Zoom meeting if you wish to raise something, but please advise the Clerk in advance and she will then advise how you can be part of the meeting.

Something that was raised at the meeting is that the Parish Council would like to take part in BBC TV's Countryfile effort to plant more trees and shrubs. Therefore we are asking our parishioners, if you feel you have room for a woodland tree or shrub in your garden, it needn't be a giant oak, please get in touch with the councillors and let us know. We hope to apply to the Woodland Trust for trees and so would appreciate it if you could let us know as soon as you can if you wish to take part. I know that a couple of people in the village, and especially the Miller Trust, have planted trees but it would be great if, as individuals, we could do more.

Recipe of the Month

Spanish-style Chicken Bake

Serves 4

Prep time 15 mins - Cooking time 1 hour - Calories 370 per serving

Ingredients:

- 1 medium onion, cut into 8 wedges
- 1 medium red onion, cut into 8 wedges
- 500g new potatoes, quartered lengthways
- 8 whole garlic cloves, unpeeled
- 8 medium tomatoes, quartered
- 75g chorizo
- 8 boneless, skinless chicken thighs
- ½tsp sweet smoked paprika
- ½tsp dried oregano
- 1 green pepper, deseeded and cut into strips
- Flaked sea salt
- Freshly ground black pepper



- Preheat the oven to 200°C/400°F/Gas Mark 6. Put the onions, potatoes, garlic and tomatoes in a large roasting tin and season with sea salt and lots of freshly ground black pepper. Toss everything together lightly and roast for 20 minutes.
- While the vegetables are roasting, skin the chorizo and cut the meat into thin slices – 5mm is about right. Put the chicken thighs on a board and carefully slash each one 2 or 3 times with a knife. Season all over with black pepper. Mix the paprika and oregano together and set aside.
- Take the roasting tin out of the oven, scatter the chorizo over the veg and turn everything a couple of times. Place the chicken on top of the vegetables and chorizo and sprinkle with the paprika and oregano. Season with a little salt and return to the oven for 20 minutes.
- Take the tin out of the oven. Holding one corner carefully with an oven cloth, lift the tin a little so all the juices run to the opposite end, then spoon and drizzle the juices back over the chicken. Tuck the pepper strips loosely around the chicken and vegetables.
- Turn the oven up to 220°C/425°F/Gas Mark 7. Put the tin back in the oven for another 20 minutes or until the peppers are just softened and the chicken is golden and crisp.





IMPORTANT ALERT - Vaccine scams

There has been a lot of reporting in the national media on this subject, including an elderly victim who paid for a fake vaccine jab in her home. Derbyshire Police has reported fraudsters cold calling victims and asking them to pay for the vaccine over the phone. Additionally, beware of persons calling at your door impersonating the NHS and requesting monies for a vaccine.

Coronavirus vaccines will only be available via the National Health Services. You can be contacted by the NHS, your employer, a GP surgery or pharmacy local to you, to receive your vaccine. **Remember, the vaccine is free of charge. At no point will you be asked to pay. The NHS will never ask you for your bank account or card details or for your PIN or banking password.**

- The NHS will never arrive unannounced at your home to administer the vaccine.
- The NHS will never ask you to prove your identity by sending copies of personal documents such as your passport, driving licence, bills or pay slips.

If you receive a call you believe to be fraudulent, hang up. If you are suspicious about an email you have received, forward it to:

report@phishing.gov.uk

Suspicious text messages should be forwarded to the number **7726** which is free of charge.

If you believe you are the victim of a fraud, please report this to Action Fraud as soon as possible by calling 0300 123 2040 or visiting:

DRINK DRIVING

Over 200 people arrested on suspicion of drink or drug driving offences in December

More than two hundred drink or drug driving arrests were made by Kent Police officers in December 2020.

In support of a national policing campaign, which runs each festive period, officers from the Roads Policing Unit carried out proactive patrols to target motorists who were suspected to be a danger to other road users.

Their efforts were supported by other teams from across the county and, between them, 465 vehicles were stopped over the course of the month.

In total, 224 people were arrested on suspicion of driving while impaired and 60 charges have already been authorised. Enquiries into most of the other cases remain ongoing.

The Roads Policing Unit will continue to patrol the county's roads to identify dangerous drivers before they cause a collision.


