Woodnesborough Parish Council

The Parish Council met on 28th March and 25th April. The ordinary meeting in April was held at 6pm in the Miller Room at the Village Hall as our Annual Parish Meeting followed this in the atrium of the Village Hall. The meeting in March followed our normal pattern but in April, we had 10 members of the public at our ordinary meeting as they wished to put their concerns to the council regarding a planning application. The meeting was adjourned to enable those views to be put forward and after the meeting was reopened and business continued.

After the minutes had been read and signed and any actions dealt with, at each meeting, the council discussed the planning applications before us and we noted any planning decisions. Planning correspondence and other communications were noted by the council. The consultation documents were recorded by the council and we had reports from our County Cllr prior to the meetings.

Correspondences were discussed including the lack of assistance with regard to the new litter bin, but we continue working on it.

We discussed various matters relating to the Village Hall including grass cutting arrangements and also our plans for a flagpole and matters relating to the play area. After agreeing the finance the meetings closed.

Our Annual Parish Meeting was held in the Atrium of the Village Hall on 25th April, directly after our general meeting, so it was a quick move along the corridor to set out chairs and arrange the refreshments. After the minutes from the last parish meeting were read and signed and any matters arising considered, Ken Flower kindly gave us an update on the workings of the Village Hall. His, and the committee's dedication was acknowledged and the Chair thanked them for all the hard work they put in voluntarily. After refreshments the Chair gave her report, Jo our Clerk gave the finance report and we received reports from our District Councillor and County Councillor. Questions were invited after each speaker and any queries answered. We also have the NALC Community Award to present but unfortunately the recipients were not present so this will be presented at another time.

Thank you all who came to our meetings, for taking an interest in your council. Don't forget that you can come along to any of our meetings as we are here to ensure our parishioners are our priority and it's always good to have members of the public at our meetings. Hello everyone, the inspiration for my column this

edition came from a trip my wife and I made recently to the small Welsh island of Bardsey (in Welsh – Ynys Enlli). We were there at the end of April and one species I was keen to see was a member of the crow family – the Chough (sometimes known as the Red-billed Chough). I had seen one many years ago when we visited the Hebridean island of Islay but I wasn't photographing birds then, so it was on my 'wish list'.

This may seem to have little to do with Woodnesborough and its environs, but here is the connection. The Chough was once a common sight on the cliffs and chalk grasslands around Dover. Like many species, persecution and changes in farming practices caused a rapid decline and they have not been present locally for over 200 years. As an indication that they were once well known here, the Canterbury Coat of Arms has 3 Choughs on it – something I must have seen many times during my life, and only fairly recently noted it.

It may soon be possible to see Choughs, with their aerial displays of wheeling, diving and swooping, over Dover cliffs again soon. Over many years, large areas of cliff top grassland have been managed to restore the habitat required by these birds; short, grazed grassland rich in flowering plants provides a good source of nectar and pollen that attracts a wide variety of insects. In turn, these insects and their pupae are an essential food source for the Chough, whose bright red, curved beak is perfectly suited to probe for them in the short turf and thin soil that is characteristic of chalk grassland.

Kent Wildlife Trust together with Wildwood Trust have an ongoing reintroduction programme where chicks are being reared in captivity with the aim of releasing them to the restored areas of cliff top until a self-sustaining population is achieved. So keep your eyes open in the near future, you may see a sight not witnessed for more than 200 years! See the Kent Nature Trust website for more information.



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
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Sandwich to Sandwich Bay Walk – 5 miles - 2 hours approx. This can be done in reverse for a variation.



Starting at Sandwich Quay, follow the pedestrian and cycle path along the river past the playground then alongside the river to a FP junction. Take the right-hand path marked White Cliffs Country Trail/Saxon Shore Walk. Follow this to a bridge over the stream, then across the road by Royal St George's Golf Course. Continue on FP opposite which goes across the famous golf course. Make sure to follow the well-marked footpath signs. At the road along Sandwich Bay, cross over and turn left either along the road to Princes Golf Club or along the beach. Just before the Princes Golf Club building and car park look for a FP on the left marked Stour Valley Walk, which goes behind the Club, then across country to New Downs Farm, where it meets a road. Cross the road and continue following the FP over a small bridge, then alongside the stream, then back alongside the River Stour to Sandwich Quay.



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

The Great Glen Way Walk – May 2023

I have just returned from a wonderful long-distance walk which will stay in my mind forever. The Great Glen Way is a 77-mile path from Fort William to Inverness. As the name suggests, it follows the Great Glen, the natural geological

fault line running across Scotland from southwest to northeast.

The walk begins at Fort William, in the shadow of Ben Nevis, Britain's highest mountain. From the shores of Loch Linnhe the route heads north along the Caledonian Canal, before continuing along the banks of Loch Lochy, Loch Oich and Loch Ness. Finally leaving Loch Ness, it travels through the Abriachan Forest and plateau to arrive at Inverness, capital of the Highlands, finishing at the Castle.

The Great Glen Way is easier than many long-distance walks as it is a predominantly low-level walk along tranquil canal towpaths, enchanting forest tracks and woodland paths and ancient cattle drovers' routes. It is a very well way marked route with clear guide posts along the way, painted blue and bearing the emblem of a thistle. The paths and trackways were all excellent and well-maintained.

I decided to walk the Great Glen Way as I had walked the West Highland Way in 2018 which finishes in Fort William, where the Great Glen Way starts, so it would be a continuation of this previous walk. Once again, it was a solo walk for me, which I actually enjoyed, as I could walk at my own pace and stop wherever I wanted. I encountered many other walkers along the route and would often stop for a chat or walk with them for part of the way. In the evenings I would meet other people walking the route at the B&Bs where I stayed and we would exchange our experiences.

I also had the 'full Loch Ness experience' by going on an hour's cruise on this vast and profound loch, 23 miles long and 754ft deep, which extends over one third of the Great Glen. There was an interesting commentary about how the loch is constantly being scanned by sonar, but sadly Nessie the Loch Ness Monster was as elusive as ever (apart from in the gift and souvenir shops of course).



The majority of the walking was through lush pine forests and ancient woodlands, home to rare native wildlife such as pine martens, red squirrels, Scottish wildcats and golden eagles. I am not an expert on bird songs, but I could frequently hear the sound of cuckoos. I recognised a kestrel and a

buzzard circling over the treetops and one day a young roe deer with its white rump hurried away when it heard me approaching.

I walked in early May when the hillsides above the lochs and the canal banks were covered with brilliant yellow gorse. Heather along the path was beginning to form its tiny flowers and spruce and fir trees were sprouting their cones. Clusters of primroses, wood anemones and bluebells alongside the path were my constant companions.

In two sections of the Great Glen Way it divides into a High and Low Route. Each time I took the high route, which provided stunning views of the lochs of the Great Glen and wonderful vistas of distant mountains, some with their summits covered in snow. The fine weather made this even more spectacular, and I felt very lucky to have this experience.



Some of the rich history and culture of Scotland was revealed as I walked past ancient forts and castles. Mysterious abandoned sailing craft and large flat - bottomed wooden boats could be seen resting on some of the sandy beaches along the loch shores.

The Caledonian Canal itself, a marvel of engineering, was designed by Thomas Telford

and William Jessop and opened in 1822 to link the west and east coasts of Scotland via the lochs of the Great Glen fault. Highlights along the route are the series of eight locks called Neptune's Staircase at Banavie and the flight of four locks at Fort Augustus, where I watched two colourful large sailing boats being raised up through each lock at a time.

So, I would recommend the Great Glen Way as a longdistance walk, easily achievable by an 'average' walker in

6-7 days, with many interesting places to stay overnight, such as Fort Augustus and Drumnadrochit. It could also be done in single sections, as there is a good bus service along much of the route. I met lots of people cycling the Great Glen Way and even some people canoeing it. There is much information to be found on the website:

to help with planning. So why not challenge yourself and embark on an adventure?

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

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

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Recipe of the Month

Baked Feta and Green Veg Potato Salad

Serves 4-6

This easy feta potato salad recipe partners roasted new potatoes with feta and olives from the Med, plus spring veg, to create a warm salad. It's perfect for sharing with friends in the garden with a chilled glass of white wine.

Ingredients:

- 2 tbsp olive oil
- 200g baby courgettes, halved lengthways
- 110g baby leeks, sliced
- 250g block feta (check it's veggie if you need it to be)
- ½ tsp regular chilli flakes
- Handful thyme sprigs
- 4 tbsp olive oil
- Grated zest and juice 1 lemon
- 750g baby new potatoes, halved (or quartered if large)
- 2 garlic cloves, sliced
- 150g young broad beans (or use frozen peas)
- Large handful chopped parsley and mint leaves
- 150g pitted kalamata olives, halved

Method:

- Heat the oven to 180°C fan/ gas 6. Put the courgettes, leeks, block of feta, pepper flakes and thyme in a roasting tin, drizzle with half the oil, then scatter with the lemon zest.
- In another roasting tin, toss the potatoes and garlic with the rest of the oil and some salt and pepper.
- Put both trays in the oven. After 20 minutes remove both trays. Toss the potatoes and return to the oven for another 20 minutes. Stir the broad beans/ peas into the veg and feta tray, return it to the oven for 10 minutes more to cook through, then set it aside until the potatoes are done.
- Once the potatoes are golden and crisp, toss them in the tin with the feta (it will soften and turn crumbly as it cooks) and veg to mix everything well. Serve scattered with the fresh herbs, olives and lemon juice (to taste).
